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MRM – Research Methods (The PhD Journey)

Introduction

This course is intended to give students an understanding of the overall PhD journey with its many milestones. Class discussions will cover a broad range of topics, from managing the PhD process to anchoring oneself within the broader academic community while working toward their advanced degree and beyond.

Objectives

It is very difficult to write a handbook or find a source explaining the PhD journey as it is different for everyone who undertakes it. Each individual student deals with many different issues during her PhD studies and their journeys can involve so many variations on an array of issues that there are often no clear answers. Indeed, it is this inherent ambiguity that makes the journey sometimes frustrating but, at the same time, motivating. Our goal is to provide some structure and best practices to help students along the PhD journey. The course aims to provide a general overview of the process and prepare them to master the initial milestones. In particular, we will focus on working towards the 2nd-year paper and presentation that are the key formal milestones in the transition from to MRM to PhD. The best way to learn about the PhD journey is to discuss it with peers, scholars alike, learning from each other and building upon everyone's experiences. This course is designed to serve as the beginning of that experience.

Learning Outcomes

- Students can work towards the 2nd year deliverables for the MRM: paper and presentation.
- Explore ideas and databases that could help them move forward during the summer period and beyond.
- Increase understanding of the process of the PhD and the milestones that must be met along the way.
- Understand the challenges that come with any PhD journey and gain exposure to tools and processes that can help to overcome these challenges.
- Practice communicating research interests and ways to engage with interested faculty and advisors.
- Learn to systematically assess papers submitted to conferences and journals.
- Anticipate opportunities and challenges in the job market and how to plan for them.

Competences

Evaluation

Grading is based on three factors:

SE1: 30% participation and engagement in class. Contribution to the class learning will be determined by active participation in class discussions both in terms of quality and quantity.

SE3: 40% the final 2nd year contract, which is developed over the term and presented on the final day of classes.
